
GLAD TIDINGS

Common Troparia for Days of the Week

Common for Monday - Holy Angels Troparion - Tone 4:

Leaders of the heavenly armies, although we are unworthy, we always beseech you to fortify us by your prayers and to shelter us beneath the wings of your sublime glory. Watch over us who bow to you and cry out fervently: Deliver us from danger. For you are the commanders of the powers on high.

Kontakion - Tone 2:

Leaders of God's armies and ministers of divine glory, commanders of angels and guides of mortals, plead on our behalf for what we need and for great mercy; since you are the leaders of the heavenly hosts.

Common for Tuesday - the Holy Forerunner John Troparion - Tone 2:

The memory of the righteous is celebrated with praise, but for you, O Forerunner, the Lord's testimony is enough. You were shown to be more honorable than the prophets since you were deemed worthy to baptize in the waters the Lord you had proclaimed. Therefore, you fought for the truth and with joy proclaimed the good news to those in Hades, that God has appeared in the flesh to take away the sins of the world and to grant us great mercy.

Kontakion - Tone 3:

Today she who once was barren gives birth to Christ's forerunner. He himself is the fulfillment of all prophecy; for in the Jordan, he imposed his hand upon the Word of God whom the prophets had foretold and was shown to be his prophet, herald, and forerunner.

Common for Wednesday- Holy Cross Troparion - Tone 1:

Save your people, O Lord, and bless your inheritance. Grant victory to your Church over evil and protect your people by your cross.

Kontakion - Tone 4:

Christ our God, who were willingly raised upon the cross, grant your mercies to the new people who bear your name. By your power grant joy to the Church. Give her victory over evil with your invincible trophy, the weapon of peace, as an ally.

Common for Thursday - the Apostles and St. Nicholas Troparion of the Apostles - Tone 3:

O holy apostles, intercede with the merciful God that he may grant our souls forgiveness of sins.

Troparion of Nicholas - Tone 4:

Your life has shown you to your flock as a rule of faith, an image of gentleness, and a teacher of moderation. You acquired greatness through humility and wealth through poverty. O Father and Archbishop Nicholas, intercede with Christ our God to save our souls.

Kontakion of the Apostles - Tone 2:

Lord, you have received your steadfast and inspired preachers, the foremost of your apostles, into the enjoyment of your good gifts and repose. You preferred their sufferings and death above any sacrifice. For you alone know the secrets of the heart.

Kontakion of Nicholas - Tone 3:

You were renowned as a priest in Myra, O holy Nicholas; for you fulfilled the Gospel of Christ, O venerable Father. You risked your life for your people and saved the innocent from death. Thereby you have been initiated into the mysteries of God's grace.

Common for Friday -- Holy Cross Troparion - Tone 1:

Save your people, O Lord, and bless your inheritance. Grant victory to your Church over evil and protect your people by your cross.

Kontakion - Tone 4:

Christ our God, who were willingly raised upon the cross, grant your mercies to the new people who bear your name. By your power grant joy to the Church. Give her victory over evil with your invincible trophy, the weapon of peace, as an ally.

Common for Saturday -- the Saints and the Departed Troparion of the Saints - Tone 2:

Apostles, martyrs, and prophets, bishops, venerable and righteous saints, you have finished the course and have kept the faith. Since you can approach the Savior with confidence, we ask you to beseech his goodness on our behalf, for the salvation of our souls.

Troparion for the Departed - Tone 2:

O Lord, in your goodness, remember your servants and forgive whatever sins they committed in their life; for no one is sinless but you alone. You have the power to grant rest to the departed.

Kontakion for the Departed - Tone 8:

With the saints, O Christ, give rest to your servants, where there is no pain, sorrow, nor mourning, but life everlasting.

Kontakion of the Saints - Tone 8:

To you, O Lord, Gardener of all creation, the world offers the God-bearing martyrs as the first fruits of nature. Through their prayers and through the Theotokos preserve your Church, your dwelling-place, in perfect peace, O most merciful One.



The disciples were not losing time when they sat down beside their Master, and held quiet converse with Him under the olives of Bethany or by the shores of Galilee. Those were their school hours; those were their feeding times. The healthiest Christian, the one who is best fitted for Godly living and Godly labors, is he who feeds most on Christ.



Author—Zechariah, whose name means "he whom God remembers." He was born in Babylon, returning to Judah in 537 BC. Zechariah's prophetic ministry was well established in Babylon among the people in captivity. He was from the tribe of Judah, succeeding his grandfather Addo as a prophet. Haggai was his contemporary. Zechariah is commemorated on February 8.

Date-520-480 BC. Zechariah's prophecies coincide with those of Haggai.

Major Theme—Encouraging the returned captives to rebuild the temple. The prophecies of Zechariah are messianic, apocalyptic, and eschatological.

Zechariah foretold Christ's coming in lowliness and humility (6:12; 13:7), His rejection and betrayal for thirty pieces of silver (11:12, 13), His crucifixion (13:7), His priesthood (6:13), His heritage (6:13; 9:9; 14:9, 16), His coming in glory (14:4), His building of the Lord's temple (6:12, 13), his reign (9:10, 14), and His establishment of peace and prosperity (3:10; 9:9, 10).

As to the apocalyptic and eschatological emphasis, the prophecies foretold the invasion of Jerusalem (12:1-3; 14:1, 2), the victory of Judah's enemies (14:2), the Lord's defense of Jerusalem (14:3, 4), the judgment on the nations (12:9; 14:3), the geographical changes in Judah (14:4, 5), the commemoration of the Feast of Tabernacles in the messianic age (14:16-19), and the fulfillment of the prophecies about the holiness of the Israelites (14:20, 21).

This book also develops the theology of angels, as God communicates through them to Zechariah. Many New Testament apocalyptic images are foreshadowed in this book.

Background—In the first year of Cyrus the Great of Persia, a decree was issued permitting the return of the Jews to Jerusalem with a commission to rebuild the temple. The Israelites were led back by Zerubbabel and Joshua. Zerubbabel, son of Shealtiel, was the heir to the throne of David. In 520 BC, Zechariah and Haggai attempted to rouse the remnant of returned exiles to rebuild the temple.

A PROMISE IS FULFILLED

he childhood of the Mother of God is as much of a mystery to us as that of her Divine Son. What we do know about her early life has been handed down to us by sacred tradition.



These sources tell us that the Virgin Mary was born of humble, saintly parents – Joachim and Anna – who waited patiently to be blessed with a child. Still childless at an advanced age, Joachim and Anna made a solemn promise to God: if He would give them a child, they, in turn, would offer that child up to the service of the Lord in the temple.

God heard the fervent prayers of Joachim and Anna, and a daughter was born to them. How great their joy must have been! What happiness the young girl Mary must have brought them! But they had made a solemn vow that had to be kept: Mary must be taken to Jerusalem for a higher calling!

The liturgical hymns prescribed for the Feast Day of the Entry of the Theotokos into the Temple vividly describe that fulfillment of this promise. We sing of a glorious procession of maidens carrying lamps as they lead the Mother of God into the Holy of Holies. We are told of Zacharias the great High Priest waiting to accept her. We hear the saintly Anna cry out to him: "Receive her of whom the prophets did preach in the spirit. Take her into the temple to be brought up in purity, so that she may become a divine throne to the Lord."

The Feast Day of the Entry of the Theotokos into the Temple is a lesson in SACRIFICE, OBEDIENCE and DEDICATION. May we be as eager to give the Lord whatever He may ask of us. May our lives be consecrated to serving Him as best we can.
