MOVING MOUNTAINS

If you believe you will receive whatever you ask for in prayer Matthew 21: 22

Some might rather have the prayer promise here expressed in connection with a more attractive miracle. We are puzzled as we read the surrounding passages. The cursing of the fig tree and its nearly immediate withering bothers most. We would rather think of the power of prayer in connection with positive events, not negative ones. We prefer our own fuzzy and cuddly warm approach to God because it demands nothing but a smile and a happy thought which just about anyone can arouse within themselves. And if that is what being good implies, we reason, then certainly we will follow Christ.

But our Lord is speaking to men who would become the foundation of the Church, his Body, the vehicle of salvation of the world, and like it or not, the Church would inevitably face fierce enemies and wage bitter battles. He knew that his followers would have to call God at times to wield his almighty power against those who were bent on destroying his people. So He challenged them to believe that prayer would move physical mountains if it could transform spiritual souls.

Of course, our great puzzlement comes in trying to comprehend just what it might mean to tell a mountain to throw itself into the sea. Jesus was using a compelling figure of speech here, obviously. Getting mountains to toss themselves around is the height of the impossible, is it not? Os so it would seem to us in our superficial grasp of actually being a genuine disciple of Christ. Jesus is simply telling us to pray that impossible circumstances be changed because changed they can be.

Many of the problems we face in life are, for example as big as mountains. And how miserable they can make us sometimes! But we must respond to the invitation of the Saviour who fulfills all things and believe and pray and wait to see how our heavenly Father will inevitably solve them. If we belong to him, then so does whatever challenges and perplexes us.

The Lord is aware of the mountains of difficulties and problems which fill our lives. We must believe what He has taught us and so we dare pray about them, entrusting them to his solution, knowing He hears us.

Fail Your Way To Success

The secret of success is to know how to survive failure.

Failure is not fatal; it just feels that way sometimes. That's what some people tell themselves as they embark upon a career and way of life. The would-be writer may be astonished each time he receives the standard two line letter from an editor telling him why his masterpiece is unpublishable! We can become brilliant insightful failures, though, because it may happen so many times.

Failure is not bitter if not swallowed. Although a failure does feel like forever, it is fleeting. Each time one fails, it can be celebrated with success. A fear of failure can so often overwhelm a desire to succeed. If you do not understand failure, failure will undermine you. We, all of us, must graduate from the school of failure if we are to gain entrance into the university of success. Failure does not stand in the way; it is the way to advancing and growing and becoming stronger and a better. Nobody begins as a success; failure is the fire that forges the metal in us to succeed. By learning how to fail well we learn how to succeed well. Here are some thoughts on failure.

There are only lessons. Every event in the universe offers a teaching. Look for the lesson and you can then pass the grade. There are no failures; only lessons to be learned. Lessons are everywhere if you "see" them.

Failures teach success. Every failure is a step to success if you take it that way. By learning how not to succeed you are automatically learning more about how to succeed. Every failure is a lesson in success.

Failures are not "bad." It is what you do with failure that makes it so. If you take it that failure is "bad", "bad" is what you will get. Instead, look for the good news in every failure. It is an invitation to further improve oneself.

Failures can be "good." Every event in the universe can be helpful if you take it that way. Defeat can stand you on your feet; endings make ways for beginnings, the worst trial can set you free from prior

misunderstandings. Make your failures work for you, not against you.

Failures are not final. Failure is not falling down; it is staying down, and even then all you are doing is learning another lesson. Perhaps the ultimate lesson is that you are always free in life to take another chance for yourself. Are you willing? Will you simply continue to do what you should be doing until you actually cooperate with God's grace to save your own soul and that of those around you?

PRAYER AND FORGIVENESS

If you hold anything against anyone, forgive him, so that your Father...
may forgive you your sins
Mark 11: 25.

We are often astonished by Jesus' description of the power of prayer. It is hard for us to comprehend how prayer can accomplish so much, but what is really meant is that it expresses the strength of the soul which is enriched and empowered by faith response to our heavenly Father. It is not trusting God can, but knowing He will do what He says. Prayer can then move mountains, that is, it can provide solutions to impossible problems. But there are conditions.

In the gospel of St. Mark, the conditions are described more fully than elsewhere. Once again faith is prominently not only mentioned, but made necessary. An empty soul cannot approach its Creator, nor can one blemished and dirty in sin and faithlessness. But there is another condition here: anyone who stands before the Lord and asks him to do the impossible must examine himself and make sure that he does not harbor hatred. He must forgive those who have wronged him. He must correct the circumstances that are sinfully present. Otherwise God will not listen when a barricade of separating sin surrounds the petitioner.

This brings us up short. We wouldn't think that our relationships with our spouses, children, coworkers, and other would have anything to do with the effectiveness of prayer. But they do. Our willingness to forgive those who have hurt us is the measure of how well we understand God's forgiving love. We create and readily participate in circumstances which separate us from the Lord. The woman who marries a non-baptized pagan in the civil arena is only pretending and playing at marriage. Why she becomes angry when she cannot become a part of the communion line is difficult to grasp. She has eagerly made the separation from Christ on her own, thinking that lust is love. Instead of correcting the situation, she harbors grudges against the Church, against the parish priest who upholds the precepts of Christ and protects from further, far more dangerous sacrilegious sin. But too many are unwilling to make the adjustments to smooth out their own profiles even though they must do so to fully understand God's fullness of encompassing love.

The first word of our prayer won't get through to our heavenly Father unless He first forgives us. And He cannot move mountains for people who refuse to change their circumstances and move the mountains of their own sinful creation.

FOLLOWING CHRIST: A FAMILY AFFAIR

epicted on the cover of this morning's Church Bulletin is an entire family of saints: XENOPHON, his wife MARIA and their sons JOHN and ARCADIUS. They lived in Constantinople in the fifth century, and Xenophon and Maria were well respected citizens of the capital of the Byzantine Empire. possessing great wealth, they distinguished themselves by living a simple life that centered on doing charitable works.

As their sons John and Arcadius grew older, the pious parents wished to give their sons the best possible education, so they sent them to study in Beirut, then a Phoenician center of learning. On their journey, the ship upon which the brothers sailed was destroyed in a terrible storm. Each was washed ashore in a different location, and each took up residence in a monastery, not knowing the fate of one another. After no news of their sons for a long period of time, Xenophon and Maria presumed their children to be dead.

After two years of mourning, Xenophon and Maria embarked upon a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Imagine their joy when they visited two monasteries there and found their sons to be alive! Out of gratitude to the Lord, Xenophon and Maria gave everything they owned to the poor and entered separate monasteries themselves. The brothers went out into the wilderness together and spent the rest of their lives in prayer and fasting, gaining a reputation for being wonderworkers. The parents as well practiced asceticism until their dying days. Through

the example of Xenophon, Maria, John and Arcadius, the Church teaches us that patiently dealing with great trials in life can lead to experiencing even greater spiritual happiness.

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
