


#### **GLAD TIDINGS**

#### Resurrection

Next he was seen by James, then by all the apostles 1 Corinthians 15: 7.

Finally, as they were all at table, Jesus was revealed to the eleven Mark 16: 14.

In the time after his suffering he showed them in many convincing ways that he was alive, appearing to them and speaking about the reign of God Acts of the Apostles 1: 3.

Men of Galilee, they said, why do you stand here looking up at the skies? This Jesus who has been taken from you will return, much as you saw him go up into the heavens Acts of the Apostles 1: 11.

Last of all he was seen by me as one born out of normal course 1 Corinthians 15: 8.

I am Jesus, the one you are persecuting Acts of the Apostles 9: 5.

What then are we to say, Let us continue in sin that grace may abound? Certainly not! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? Are you not aware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Through baptism into his death we were buried with him, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too, might live a new life. If we have been united with him through likeness to his death, so shall we be through a like resurrection. This we know, our old self was crucified with him so that the sinful body might be destroyed and we might be slaves to sin no longer. A man who is dead has been freed from sin. If we have died with Christ, we believe that we are also to live with him. We know that Christ, once raised from the dead, will never die again; death has no more power over him. His death was death to sin, once for all; his life is the life of God. In the same way you must consider yourselves dead to sin, but alive for God in Christ Jesus Romans 6: 1-11.

## Sunday of St. Thomas

Everyone has heard the expression, "doubting Thomas," because it is used to describe a person who is not inclined to believe things. The expression, of course, comes to us from St. Thomas, one of the Lord's twelve disciples who refused to believe that Jesus actually and really rose from the dead.

When Christ was crucified, the disciples fled in fear of their lives. They felt that the bottom had dropped from the hope and love of their hearts. Jesus had come to mean everything to them. Their lives were wound up in his life, just as the planets spin around the sun.

And now He was dead. For a day they brooded in silent solitude, feeling separated, alienated, even betrayed. Then, as Sunday dawned, they began to edge back to Jerusalem. They sought out one another, showing the sorrow and anguish of their hearts.

By Sunday evening they had all gathered together. All, except the apostle, Thomas were there. Perhaps he had fled anxiously so far that he couldn't get back in time. Perhaps his sorrow was so deep and profound that he could not stand to return and talk about the Lord. At any rate, the apostles were assembled in Jerusalem.

They locked the doors in fear. Suddenly, without any warning, Jesus stood among them! They looked at him, they looked at the closed locked doors and then they looked at one another, but could not believe the sight their eyes delivered them. The Lord speaks, shows them his wounds and assures them of his Resurrection from the dead.

The apostles are ecstatic, overcome with joy at this remarkable turn of events. Some time later, when they meet again, and St. Thomas is with them, they tell him the good news.

There is no longer reason for gloom and doom. "We have seen the Lord!" But Thomas reacted typically in human fashion. He felt badly he had been left out of the joy of the rest of Christ's followers. He now says, "Unless I see in his hands the print

of the nails and put my finger into the place of the nails, and thrust my hand into his side. I will not believe."

No wonder He was given the nick name "doubting Thomas." No wonder this expression has come down to our day expressing as it does the disbelieving person.

A week later the apostles are once again gathered together for prayer. This time Thomas is among them. Again the risen Lord suddenly appears despite the once again locked doors in the upper room.

Jesus particularly addresses Thomas, saying, "Reach here your finger and look at my hands and touch them. Place your hand into my side and do not be faithless, but believing." All doubt is reduced to nothing. Thomas falls to his knees and cries out to Christ, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus uses this occasion to teach a deep and abiding truth that reaches down to us. He appeals to the sensitivity of soul in Thomas; because you have seen me, you believe. Far more blessed are those who have not seen, but yet believe."

There are so many times in our lives when circumstances lead us to doubt, to disbelieve. But we are called upon today to look at the Resurrection of Christ and overcome the weakness of faith which we often see about us and strengthen it with our renewed commitment to the risen Saviour.

People will always disappoint us, because after all, they are only people, weak, sinful creatures like ourselves.

When we are disappointed by others, think for a moment, how many times we are a disappointment to them! But Christ alone does not disappoint; Christ alone affirms and confirms our faith. In Christ we do not misplace our devotion.

Yes, it is true, others like us cannot always be expected to live up to the expectations we have of them. They sin, they fail, they stumble, but in seeing their brokenness, their fragile response, their not so noble effort, we can realize that it is only to Christ we are to be fully and completely devoted and faithful, because He alone does not disappoint.

Yes, our wives, our husbands do not always have the strength to resist the temptations we think we can renounce easily. Yes, it is true even faithful friends

disappoint because they stumble, because they make mistakes, because they lapse in judgment, because they are momentarily weak and often sinful, needing our prayerful understanding and certain ready forgiveness.

What we should thank our God for, however, are moments of truth, moments of faithful response, moments of devoted service, moments of undying fidelity, moments of victory in their character and relationship with us. Yes, we will all fall, we will all fail from time to time in our own way.

Those are not the times to remember and emphasize. What we ought to think about and be thankful for are the good times, the perilous, but overwhelmingly successful times when God's grace helps us grow, when his strength is made manifest in our lives and those whom we love and respect. We ought to remember the "Thomas times," the times faith erupts and expresses itself, not the limited, small demeaning, even hurtful times. Remember the times when God's victory encircles us and our circumstances.

Our Lord assures us "Without me, you can do nothing." From time to time, we depend on ourselves, on our own insights what we think are superior insights, eagerly forgetting the challenges of our God, which unquestionably are higher than those of sin-weakened man.

From time to time we think our impressions are more valuable than those of others, but too late do we recognize frail humanity always fails when it does not depend on or call upon the grace and heavenly strength of the Lord.

The Lord was not condemnatory of Thomas. What Thomas did was not purposeful, was not neglectful, was not mean-spirited or sinister or derisive; it was only weakly human which means often times that it can be lacking in depth, in insight and in virtue. The Lord reveals himself to Thomas and chides him, "Because you saw you believe."

Perhaps those whom we love from time to time do not see as clearly as the Lord sees, do not see as we see, do not have the perception we enjoy, so they fail, they fall and they sin. With the risen Saviour on the scene, they are lifted, they too are raised to his dignity, they are corrected.

Today is a good time for each of us to recognize ourselves in the person of Thomas, eager, willing and hopeful of doing something good, but also, finding out our efforts can sometimes produce no virtue, only shortsightedness and even disaster.

It is good to see ourselves in the person of our Lord, who by his gentleness, kindness, by his affirmation, by his forgiving soul corrects the doubter and confirms him in faith by his own positive behavior. If in doubt, it is to the Saviour we ought turn, not to our own deceptive perceptions or those of others. If victory over death is to have meaning, it must have meaning for us personally.

The distraught Thomas is restored because of the stability of Christ's loving victory, because of His presence. Just as Christ came purposely to confirm the lost faith and restore that of Thomas, so He is among us today in the Eucharistic celebration to uplift us, to restore us to our rightful dignity, to give us a place of victory in his kingdom in spite of ourselves, in spite of our well-meaning loved ones who often fail to please us and in spite of our own limited perceptions of goodness in their souls. Let us in gratitude respond with Thomas, "My Lord and my God" because in Christ we will never be disappointed and demeaned.


Let us never forget the words of the wise man who said, "There is so much good in the worst of us and so much bad in the best of us that it ill behooves all of us to condemn the rest of us." May we also rise above the limitations of our own humanity to celebrate and triumph with the Lord. Christ is risen!


Let not your heart be troubled,

#### MORE THAN JUST A "DOUBTER"

mpressions of people are very difficult to change. The Apostle Thomas, for example will always be remembered for having a lack of faith. His statement - UNLESS I SEE IN HIS HANDS THE PRINT OF THE NAILS, AND PUT MY FINGER INTO THE PRINT OF THE NAILS, AND PUT MY HAND IN HIS SIDE, I WILL NOT BELIEVE - will forever label him as the "doubting Thomas."

It should be noted, however, that Thomas also leaves behind a rich legacy of missionary service. After the descent of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost, tradition tells us that the Apostles cast lots to see where each of them would go to preach the Gospel. It fell upon Thomas to travel to India to spread the message of the Risen Christ. Although reluctant to embark upon such a lengthy journey, Thomas went to India, winning over a great number of converts to the Christian faith. Among his converts were two sisters, Tertiana and Mygdonia, who were married to Indian princes. The husband of Tertiana was so angered by this that he ordered Thomas to be executed. Five soldiers were sent to put him to death by running him through with their lances.

Before his death, Thomas, along with the other Apostles, was miraculously borne to Jerusalem for the funeral of the Mother of God. Arriving late, Thomas asked that the tomb of Mary be opened, so that he could pay his final respects properly. Miraculously, the body of the Theotokos was not there! The Lord had taken His Mother to His heavenly home!

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
