Eternal Life

For we know that when this tent we live in now is taken down, when we die and leave these bodies, we will have wonderful new bodies in heaven, homes that will be ours forever, made for us by God himself and not by human hands 2 Corinthians 5: 1.

If the dead will not come back to life again, then what point is there in people being baptized for those who a re gone? Why do it unless you believe that the dead will some day rise again? And why should we ourselves be continually risking our lives, facing death by the hour. For it is a fact that we face death daily; that is as true as my pride in your growth in the Lord. And what value was there in fighting wild beasts, those men of Ephesus, if it was only for what I gain in this life down here? If we will never again live again after we die, then we might as well go and have ourselves a good time; let us drink, eat and be merry. What is the difference? For tomorrow we die and that ends everything! Do not be fooled by those who say such things. If you listen to them you will start acting like them. Get some sense and quit your sinning. For to your shame I say it, some of you are not even Christians at all and have never really known God. But some may ask, how will the dead be brought back to life again? What kind of bodies will they have? What a foolish question. You will find the answer in your own garden! When you put a seed into the ground it does not grow into a plant unless it dies first. And when the green shoot comes up out of the seed, it is very different from the seed you first planted. For all you put into the ground is a dry little seed of wheat, or whatever it is you are planting. Then God gives it a beautiful new body, just the kind he wants it to have, a different kind of plant grows from each kind of seed. And just as there are different kinds of seeds, and plants, so also there are different kinds of flesh 1 Corinthians 15: 29 - 39.

If he sows to please his own wrong desires, he will be planting seeds of evil and he will surely reap a harvest of spiritual decay and death, but if he plants the good things of the Spirit, he will reap the everlasting life which the Holy Spirit gives him Galatians 6: 8

Be exalted above the heavens, O God, and let Your glory be over all the earth. Prokimenon, Feast of the Ascension of our Lord.

O my soul, extol the Lord Who in glory ascended bodily into heaven. O you who are the Mother of God in manner beyond understanding and beyond words, who gave birth in time to the Lord Whom time cannot contain; we the faithful magnify you with one accord. Hymn instead of 'It is truly Proper,' Feast of the Ascension of our Lord.

God ascended His throne amid shouts of joy, the Lord amid the sound of trumpets. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. Communion Hymn, Feast of the Ascension of our Lord.

Sickness

From God's revelation to us in Scripture we understand sickness to be afflicting someone who is under a bodily indisposition as is mentioned and described in the Old Testament and New. "...I fell sick three days ago..." 1 Samuel 30: 31; and its natural, normal, created opposite effect, "...they found the servant in perfect health" Luke 7: 10.

t also describes those who are sensible of the burden of their sins, and earnestly desire to be delivered from them by Christ the great Physician. The very purpose of the coming of Christ among us is to cure disease, both physical and spiritual. "People who are in good health do not need a doctor; sick people do. Go and learn the meaning of the words, 'It is mercy I desire and not sacrifice. I have come to call not the self-righteous, but sinners'" Matthew 9: 12, 13.

Even emotional problems can overwhelm us so we need to be refreshed as the Song of Songs teaches us, "Strengthen me with raisin cakes, refresh me with apples for I am faint with love" Song of Songs 2: 5. Thus believers who are communicants of the Church, both priests and ordinary laymen are called upon to sustain and affirm in faith commitment and truth other baptized believers who encounter problems in their daily living, supporting, strengthening and comforting the soul by applying and encouraging the promises of Christ found in the gospel message for physical and spiritual release. Man often finds himself in a languishing state for want of full enjoyment and understanding and actual living sense of Christ's love which each person so earnestly desires and needs, the absence of which contributes to sickness and pain and languishing in misery of soul.

Sickness entered the world because we invited it. Sickness is among us because we desire it more than perfect health in creation. Adam and Eve figured life was too boring if enveloped with perfect health. They wanted serious complications and the negative elements they introduce. They wanted the excitement of illness and lusted

after it. Can you imagine, they were bored with good and perfect health? Before hand, they were warned what disobedience would bring about. They very well knew the excitement they were visiting upon themselves in wrong-doing.

Our God told them "But if you do not heed me and do not keep all these commandments, if you reject my precepts and spurn my decrees, refusing to obey all my commandments and breaking my covenant, then I, in turn will give you your just deserts, I will punish you with terrible woes — with wasting and fever to dim the eyes and sap the life. You will sow your seed in vain, for your enemies will consume the crop. I will turn against you, till you are beaten down before your enemies and lorded over by your foes. You will take to flight even though no one pursues you" Leviticus 26: 14-17; "The Lord will strike you with Egyptian boils, and with tumors, eczema and the itch until you cannot be cured. And the Lord will strike you with madness, blindness, panic and anxiety so that even at midday you will grope like a blind man in the dark, unable to find your way" Deuteronomy 28: 27-29.

Because we are made in the image and likeness of our God, He respects what He created. Because we desire sickness, He permits it to afflict us at our own invitation and desire. Because we make an independent, so – called intelligent choice, it is permitted us. As long as man alienates himself from the heartfelt desires of our Creator/Maker, he alienates himself with sickness, limitations and less than perfection. Man was created to be perfect and strive after even greater perfection in paradise, but his choices identify him as being very careless for his own needs. But God allows less than perfection to man because it can turn him around, because it can remind him of the totality of his creation, the perfection in which he was made, so that he turns around and forsakes sin, brokenness, and sickness and chooses instead always to glorify our God with perfect love and praise. Because our heavenly Father allows and recognizes our choices does not mean He approves it; He merely consents to our self chosen reality, our self-imposed alienation because He respects his own creation and its supreme gift of rational mind.

The meritorious cause of sin and alienation is the devil himself with whom man cooperates in introducing sickness and brokenness in our midst. Thus it was with Adam and Eve, thus it continues in our time and place. So when we do whatever is opposite of God's will, we submit to that of the devil and his minions. When we sin, we ally ourselves with the fallen bodiless powers and the enemies of God our

Father. When we do things that encourage sickness and separation, we become friends of the devil and champion his cause.

Thus because of our silly deadly choices, our heavenly Father permits us to fall if we so choose because we have that freedom beyond our understanding. And the end of illness and sickness is to punish us for our bad choices as in the case of the Old Testament king Hezekiah. It also manifests the glory of our God as in the case of righteous Job. But above all else it is an opportunity to magnify and extol our God and glorify his name as in the case of the man born blind from birth. Our Lord's disciples asked him if it was due to his parents' sin of or his own personal sin that he was punished with blindness. Christ is emphatic when He says, "It was no sin, either of this man or of his parents, rather it was to let God's works be made manifest in him. We must do the deeds of him who sent me" John 9: 3, 4.

So we are here today and every month, to seek the intercession of St. Nectarios the Wonderworker in our shortcomings, including our bad choices in sin, in health issues, in our negative feelings and predispositions.

We come over and again because our God invites us, insists we desire relief and invest our prayers and time. We come because we have the faith to know and believe only God can bring about change in our lives. Whether we consciously desire it or not, we introduce sin and illness in our lives. We are called upon at these services to become more conscious of our choices, to pick and choose only those things which will enable us to follow nobly in the path of the Saviour, so that all illness, fragmentation and brokenness is removed from our lives because Christ has conquered all for our sake. To his all holy name and to that of the Father and Holy Spirit, be ascribed glory, praise and honor, now and ever and forever. Amen.

I love your church, O God; her walls before me stand, but please excuse my absence, Lord, this bed is simply grand.


> A charge to keep I have; a God to glorify, but Lord, no cash from me; your glory comes too high.

WHAT KIND OF MOTHER WAS MARY?

he tradition of the Church pertaining to the age of the Virgin Mary when she gave birth to Christ is that she was extremely young - perhaps not even 16 years old.
