## **Overcoming Pride**

Pride goes before disaster, and a haughty spirit before a fall. It is better to be humble with the meek than to share plunder with the proud. He who plans a thing will be successful; happy is he who trusts in the Lord Proverbs 16: 18 - 20.

He who trusts himself is a fool, but he who walks in wisdom is safe Proverbs 28: 26.

God resists the proud but bestows his favor on the lowly James 4: 7.

Anyone among you who aspires to greatness must serve the rest, and whoever wants to rank first among you must serve the needs of all Matthew 20: 26, 27.

Give ear, listen humbly, for the Lord speaks. Give glory to the Lord, your God, before it grows dark; if you do not listen to this in your pride, I will weep in secret many tears Jeremiah 13: 15 - 17.

Man's pride causes his humiliation, but he who is humble of spirit obtains honor Proverbs 29: 23.

Before his downfall a man's heart is proud, but humility goes before honors Proverbs 18: 12.

The fear of the Lord is training for wisdom, and humility goes before honors Proverbs 15: 33.

The Lord is exalted, yet the lowly he sees, and the proud he knows from afar Psalms 138: 6.

When the Lord came upon the earth, when He entered our world, mercy was rather unknown. Among His countrymen, the law of the talon was part of everyone's life. It said that, if a man knocked out your eye, you could take him to court of law and get a judgment to knock out his as well. There was no mercy, just blind convoluted justice!

They had to make up a word for hospital at the coming of the Lord into the world; the idea of taking care of the sick had never really broken through. Do you recall the lepers and their caves outside all the communities of the chosen people? To destroy such coldness of heart, such indifference, our Lord came to light this fire of love and mercy on our earth because our sins had darkened it.

Our Lord emphasizes to us how much He desires mercy rather than sacrifice. He has come to call, not the self-righteous, but sinners to salvation. He recognized how desperately we need God's mercy. And what we must realize as Orthodox believers is how desperately we are in need of God's mercy.

Who really needs God's mercy?

The unfortunate eight year old boy who lost \$20.00 on the way to the store for his parents needs lots of mercy; parents who cannot afford braces for

their child's teeth need mercy; teenagers with acne and teen-agers who have been talked into taking drugs by their 'friends' need mercy. All of us need mercy when someone decides to lie about us. We are completely at the mercy of someone who has a tongue and is vicious with it. All of us need mercy when someone decided to tell the tough truth about us. The sick, the drunkard who needs the telephone number of Alcoholics Anonymous

needs mercy. The spouse needs mercy as well. The child, who remains unmarried during the endless years of sickness and senility of a parent needs that parent's mercy and needs mercy when we come upon them and find them somewhat bitter behind the eyes, although a smile in front is still genuine.

The young need our mercy if their parents never taught them gradual responsibility, but suddenly lowered the boom with "Now you are on your own!" The young also need mercy if they do not have the benefit of parents who provided a good, fine serious Christian example of living faith commitment to Christ, if they were not considered important enough to be accompanied each and every Sunday and holy day to the Divine Liturgy as an opportunity to praise and thank God for their blessings and unique gifts.

Mothers-in-law need our mercy as they try to keep smiling at the endless hurting jokes served up to them. Did you know that the French word for mother-in-law is *belle mere*? It means "beautiful mother". Three cheers for the mercy of the French language and the lesson it teaches us!

But the greatest interplay of mercy the world has ever known happened on Golgotha right after the bad thief more or less challenged our Lord, "If you are the Messiah, save yourself and us" It was a command, a command based on a conditional "if". And then, out of that terrible, abominable, screaming crowd, one merciful voice took up for our Lord. It was a show of mercy and it was Dismas, the repentant thief, berating the other thief: "Have you no fear of God?...we are paying the price for what we have done, but this man has done nothing wrong." And then the grace of God began to take expression in its mercy because Dismas looked at our Lord and said, "Jesus, remember me, when you come into your kingdom." He did not say, "take me with you," just simply, "remember me."

And so it was our Lord's turn to show what mercy really is. His fingers opened a bit before the crowding spike thrust through them and He whispered out of His pain, "Today, you will be with me in paradise." Totality and fullness of mercy!

Precisely for this very reason do we continually repeat and entreat the eternal mercy of our heavenly Father for ourselves at the Divine Liturgy and all other services and devotions of our holy Church. We recognize how necessary mercy is for us who continually fall short of what our God expects of us. That is why the believer is so eager to come and worship because he becomes, then, a recipient of God's freely offered mercy. He knows what it means; he experiences it. We realize we have no other recourse except to ask His mercy and in so doing also remind each other how merciful we must be to one another.

In asking for mercy from our God, we must freely offer it to each other. We must recognize we will only be recipients of God's mercy to the extent we are merciful to our fellow man. If God is eager to offer mercy to a contrite heart, who are we as His creation to withhold it from one another? If we are demeaning and demanding of each other, our God will be demanding of us! This is another reason why it is so important for the sincere and serious soul to participate in the grace of the Divine Liturgy as often as it is celebrated so that we continually remind ourselves of this requisite in our spiritual lives and how it is to be obtained. If we are

merciful, we reflect God's innate mercy and He will be merciful to us,

It is only when we have a genuine relationship with our God that mercy can be ours. We exist because of God's mercy for us. He pardons the sincere soul because of His mercy. It is one of His hallmarks as it must also, by His grace, be ours. He is our merciful Father and we depend on His mercy. We must be as eager dispensers of mercy as our God is.

But we must remember we cannot expect a truly merciful response unless we, too, have been merciful to have been ourselves. if WP worshipping and imbibing the spirit and practice of mercy we inevitably learn at the Divine Liturgy. If we are cold and indifferent to our own soul and its genuine needs, we will cavalierly overlook the importance of regular and continuing worship at the Divine Liturgy.



#### WHY DID OUR LORD LEAVE US?

Wheaven. Have you ever wondered why He did that to us? Couldn't He have stayed with us on earth forever? Wouldn't that have been a marvelous way to prove to an unbelieving world that, in fact, He was able to conquer death and rise from His tomb? These are good questions, and the answers to them have been given to us by no less of an "authority" than Christ Himself.

When Jesus shared the Passover meal with His Apostles prior to His Passion, He went to great lengths to explain to His followers the sequence of events that were about to unfold. He told them that it was necessary for Him to leave "Nevertheless I tell you the truth. It is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not, the Helper (Holy Spirit) will not come to you, but if I depart, I will send Him to you." (John 16:7) "When He, the Spirit of truth, has come, He will guide you into all truth." (John 16:13) Through the Holy Spirit, the grace of God would know no limits, but would be able to dwell within everyone. In reality, Christ, through the Holy Spirit, fulfills His promise to His Apostles and to us as well: "Lo. I am with you always, even until the end of the age." (Matthew 28:20) We sing at Vespers on the Feast of the Ascension: "The Lord ascended into heaven in order to send the Comforter into the world. Heaven prepared a throne for Him and the clouds assisted Him in His ascent. The angels wonder as they see a Man more exalted than they. The Father receives into His bosom the one Who is eternally with Him." Yes, this was all part of God's plan for us. As John Chrysostom writes concerning this great Feast: "Today the human race is completely reconciled with God. Today, we become heirs to the kingdom of heaven - we who do not even deserve earth."

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
