We are a beacon on a hill with the eyes of many upon us; that beacon is the inspired Light of Christ which must shine brightly in our lives.



Fourteenth Sunday

The Wedding Feast is significant in salvation history among the Old Covenant Chosen People. It is a sign of God's special favor and those invited to the celebration are destined for salvation in Christ. That is why it is important to notice what is happening in today's prescribed gospel reading. The king, who invites all the guests his celebration is our heavenly Father himself and as He enters the place of the banquet He catches sight of a man not properly dressed for the event. So he approaches him and asks, "How is it you came in here not properly dressed" Matthew 22: 12?

The man apparently wanted to have a good time, to celebrate an important event, but he did not seriously invest anything of himself into achieving readiness or preparation for the august event. The reading is concluded with a sobering reminder, "The invited are many, the elect are few" Matthew 22: 14. Everyone wants to get to heaven, everyone wants to win the race, everyone wants eternal salvation and security, but how may actually want to invest of themselves significantly and meaningfully enough to make this reality?

We are thus reminded of other events, such as occurred in the history of the Apostolic Church. In the Book of the Acts of the Apostles, it is said, "A few days later Felix came with his Jewish wife Drusilla and sent for Paul to hear him speak about faith in Christ Jesus. As Paul talked on about uprightness, continence, and the coming judgment, Felix became frightened. Before long he exclaimed, "that's enough for now! You can go. I'll send for you again when I find the time'" Acts of the Apostles 24: 24, 25. Felix and Drusilla did not believe salvation of their souls should be a preoccupation of their lives, a motivating purpose behind their every activity, the inspiration of their entire earthly lives. In the same precise way the lone man appeared at the wedding banquet, so Felix and Drusilla "almost" saved their souls. But "almost" does not count from the perspective of eternity.

To be almost converted and almost saved is certainly to be in a very serious and critical state. It is to be near the kingdom of God and yet, not necessarily certain of a place in that kingdom, And while it is entirely true we can never be entirely and totally sure of our place there because it is ultimately God who saves, the effort and devotion must be made; we must not deviate from the path, we must not detour to assure our abandonment by the angel of victory. What then does it mean to be almost converted, almost saved?

It means in the first instance, that the mind has been enlightened in spiritual values. So it was with Felix, so it must have been for the lone man at the banquet. They both

recognized the value of keeping company with God, except that they didn't want too much of His company, or always, or forever. They wanted heaven, but not too much of it. We read in Scripture Felix had a more perfect knowledge or understanding of that way, of the doctrines preached by St. Paul. During the six years he ruled over the Jews, Felix learned something of their precious faith and he would still learn more from his Jewish wife. Of the new way of Christianity, he must have known something of significance. It was not thirty years since the Resurrection of Jesus, the coming of the Holy Spirit and the first preaching of the apostles. The first Gentiles were received into the bosom of faith some eighteen years before in the very city of Caesarea. This new way, was therefore well-known and it was everywhere opposed and spoken against, and therefore everywhere spoken about. Therefore Felix must have known something about it even before St. Paul appeared on the scene. And now Paul gives a clear account and makes that masterful defense in the presence of his Jewish accusers and of their ruler.

A second time Felix sent for Paul that he might hear further from him for himself and Drusilla concerning the faith of Jesus Christ. His mind was enlightened. He did know something about Jesus Christ and his redemption and knew he himself was a sinner, needing redemption. And this is a vitally important step towards total conversion and fidelity to Christ.

We recall when the scribe came to Jesus and questioned him about the law and when Jesus saw he answered discreetly, He said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God" Mark 12: 34. In other words, he was almost converted. Even when St. Paul, on another occasion was teaching, being in the presence of Agrippa, he appealed to him as one expert in all questions and customs of the Jews. He said, "King Agrippa, do you believe the prophets? I know that you believe!" Acts of the Apostles 26: 27.

He, too, was almost ready to become a Christian. And so it always is. When the mind is enlightened by the Word of God, when the sinner is made to understand what he is, what he needs, where and how to get where he must go, then there is yet an important step to be taken towards profession of faith because divine enlightenment is not in itself conversion. A second step is when the conscience is aroused and leads to righteousness, uprightness, chastity and judgment to come. No wonder the guilty and now fully awakened conscience of Felix spoke in thunder tones and as Scripture reveals to us, "Felix trembled." Self-condemned and self-convicted because of the grave guilt he bore, he sat alone with excitement. Surely the scales were turned. The prisoner preacher became the judge from eternity and the governor descended into the role of the defendant. Alarmed and stricken, he acknowledged himself to be guilty.

When the conscience of the sinner is thus stirred and alarmed, then another important step is taken towards conversion. We know and believe the heart must also be touched. We believe he felt and saw his own guilt and misery, had some longings after deliverance and a better life. If his heart had not been touched and exposed, we believe he would have dismissed St. Paul in anger. But he did not. He simply intimated that he could bear to hear no more and wanted to hear again at another time. He was so deeply impressed he wanted to think it over. He hoped to have other times to learn more and become fully satisfied. We know when the heart is touched it is because Jesus of Nazareth passes by. The listener is moved toward conversion, he is almost converted. Surely Felix in a hopeful way was moved; the mind was enlightened, the conscience was aroused and the heart was directed. What did he yet lack? One other most vital faculty must be approached, reached and changed. It is the will of man which must be brought to give its assent and consent. If that happens, Felix will be entirely converted, will then fully belong to Christ.

Just like the lone man at the banquet table, all set to celebrate even though he did not have everything necessary to be there in victory and success, Felix has to come to recognize what it is that brings a sinner almost into the kingdom. He must be clothed in the garment of virtues enumerated by St. Paul in today's epistle reading, all gathered together by the primary virtue of loving charity.

The prime and original cause of all such experiences of grace is the Holy Spirit himself. He comes to the sinner and operates through the written and sacramental word, through the liturgical life of the Church, through the worship hymnology of the Body of Christ. He arouses an interest, a compelling interest in the searching and interested soul. Through the Word of God, the invited visitor at the banquet and Felix before St. Paul, both hear God's presence and invitation. Divine grace reaches down to save and no one is ever readied except by the Spirit of God. God sometimes uses other influences as helps to reach the sinner. He sends upon him a grievous affliction, a stroke, a heart attack or gives him more and bitter losses and disappointments. He lays upon him a chastening hand.

Some imagine that such afflicting and correcting dispensations convert the sinner. But this is a perceptive mistake; their actual purpose is not to convert, but to direct attention away from the sinful self on to eternal, never-ending values. They are intended to drive the sinner away from his good friend, the devil, in whose alienation he seemingly prospers on his own terms, by his own judgment. It is like the shepherds staff which cannot satisfy the hunger of the sheep, but drives them to green pastures and beside still waters where God's grace is abundantly present. Just like the eager participant for food at the banquet, not all are totally concerned about living the life of Christ.


They simply want the benefits, not the lifestyle and they decline to make the final surrender. While the intellect, the conscience and the heart have all become interested, the will of man refuses sometimes, even rebels. And as long as the will does not entirely surrender, no matter what the knowledge, the conviction and the feelings, there is no real conversion to Christ. Oftentimes what happens is there is a holding on to one sin. Some have one evil practice and they cherish it openly or secretly because they are in love with it and do not want to be separated from it. They rattle the chains of their own slavery and they clutch and kiss them as if they were cords drawing them to heaven.

So we see the power of one cherished and therefore unforgiven sin! It has kept thousands out of heaven when they were almost in. Felix was almost converted; the banquet wedding guest participant had the personal invitation, but neither would give up their own much-loved and cherished idiosyncrasies which were sinful. Judas no doubt had his better moments and his serious impressions and felt himself drawn to Christ. But he loved money overwhelmingly and was unwilling to give up that love.

In another similar instance, Ananias and Sapphira were drawn by the apostles' preaching and wanted a place in the infant Church. But he decided he could serve both God and mammon and lied to the Holy Spirit. That kept him out of the Church and out of heaven for all eternity. Today we have the same problem with people who have their own pet sins, their cherished sins, their favorite sins which they prefer to indulge and never seek forgiveness for. Thus they are in servitude to them and prefer them and choose them rather than seek God's comforting and enabling forgiveness and freedom.

And then, finally, just like Felix and Drusilla, they put off their living a genuine Christian life to what they judge would be a more convenient time. Their interest is aroused, but is peaked before it is fulfilled. The man at the banquet table decided it would be enough now to simply show up, even though he was not prepared. Apparently he had not place more interesting or important to go. He entered prematurely and did nothing to change his circumstances. Thus he never accepted the grace of the Holy Spirit fully and totally. Felix tells Paul to go away until a convenient time arrives. He drives away the Holy Spirit of forgiveness and reconciliation.

It is indeed an awful thing to trifle with conviction and not take it seriously. Christ has called all of us here every Sunday and holyday in all seriousness. He has redeemed us and saved us. Seriously think about what it means to belong to him totally and begin anew the journey which will assure us all of forever belonging to His flock in seriousness and sincerity.

"PEACE I LEAVE WITH YOU . . . "

he primary definition for the word "peace" in Webster's Dictionary is: "the state of quiet and tranquility." In Jewish tradition, "peace" was the customary word exchanged for greeting and taking leave, indicating the desire that our personal contact with one another has been a calm experience from beginning to end. That's a beautiful thought, isn't it? Persons of all races, creeds and colors long to live in that state! Individuals want peace. Families want peace. Nations want peace. Indeed, all of mankind wants peace. Yet peace is such an elusive ideal! Since Cain slew his brother Abel, it seems like it is unrealistic to think anyone can ever exist together without conflict. The majority of marriages are hardly peaceful anymore. Relationships and friendships seem so fragile. We even fight wars under the pretense of seeking peace.

Perhaps we have little peace in the world today because we are looking for it in all the wrong places! The Great Litany at the beginning of Divine Liturgy tells us precisely where to seek it: we are told that it comes from HEAVEN ABOVE not from any earthly sources. At the time of greatest turmoil in His earthly life, Christ left His Apostles with this message: "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you." (John 14:27) True peace is brought to us by the "Prince of Peace", Who carries out the work of salvation and reconciles humanity with God. It is an internal peace that He brings us - a peace which reaches the depths of the human heart and cleanses it from evil and passions, bringing real joy to our lives. Simply put, if we know Christ, we will have peace in our lives "that surpasses all understanding." (Philippians 4:7)

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
