GLAD TIDINGS



Signs Of The End

Rather than asking questions when his companion can't hear, shouldn't the first man let them both listen to the bells and then ask his questions? Of course, nobody - and no communication - is perfect, except the salutary message entrusted to us by our Lord.

Folklore Teaches

Each month the moon shines some nights and is dark on others. Here is a Nigerian folktale explaining why this is so.

Once, long ago, a hungry crocodile pleaded with an antelope for food from his farm, but was refused. Next he tried a neighboring sheep, who generously shared her food wit him. The crocodile, in turn, shared his bounty with a python. To show his gratitude for such kindness, the python gave the crocodile a jewel that lit up the night.

The sheep caught sight of the dazzling jewel and had to have it! So she traded her farm for it. But without a farm, the sheep grew hungry and had to beg her neighbor for help. Again, the antelope refused, as did other neighbors. Finally the folk god, saw the sheep's plight and fed her. The grateful sheep gave her only treasure to the folk god, who took it to the sky people to benefit all mankind.

The jewel, then was kept in a box, which was opened some nights to remind us of the sheep's generosity. But the sky people also kept the box closed part of the time to remind us of the darkness of selfishness and the problems and dangerous limitations it causes in the lives of others.

Perspective

Here is a popular story about the governor of a state and his wife out on a drive in their rare leisurely moments. As they passed through the area where the wife had grown up, they stopped for gas. When the attendant came out, the governor saw that his wife and the attendant recognized each other, though they didn't speak. The governor sensed that the attendant might be someone his wife had been involved with in her younger days.

The wife relaxed and sat silently for quite a while after they resumed their trip. Finally the governor said, "I guess that you and that fellow knew each other long ago. I bet you've been thinking how your life would have been totally different had you married him; that you would be the wife of a gas station attendant."

"Well no,": she replied, "I was actually thinking that he would have become governor."

Self-Acceptance

Many people say you better forget about yourself and love other people. Well, it does not always work quite that simply. The truth is, you must first accept yourself and love yourself with all your mistakes, all of your so-called sins, all the times you look like a fool, and all the times you have acted inappropriately. You must be able to stand before the entire world and make no excuse for yourself. When you can do that, you are coming from a position of

unconditional love. Maybe afterwards then, you will be able to share yourself with others as created in God's image.

Hands On

A prominent American public speaker once entered a Fannie May candy shop and related this encounter. At the counter was a small, older lady who had apparently already been waited on. He asked the clerk something about the selection, but the lady broke in and answered. In fact, she answered all ensuing questions, until the man became annoyed and turned his back on her, which had no deleterious effect.

Finally, the lady remembered that she had a plane to catch and left. Both the man and the clerk breathed a sigh of relief. The man was glad to be rid of the irritating pest. The clerk, however, shouted to the back room, "Okay, girls, you can relax and come out now, Fannie May is gone!"

The annoying lady was the candy chain's owner! She traveled about, visiting her shops and, as the man found out, making sure customers got all the help she could give. What seemed like intrusiveness was in fact, the pride and loving concern of ownership. Many times, loving concern and interest in another's well-being is considered intruding, but it can be a genuine expression of Christ's love if rightly perceived and understood! How many times have you misunderstood the rightful interest of others and missed an expression of God's love?

First to Know

Ms. Smigdolessa was a very good teacher, but she just didn't like one of her fifth grade students. Teddy was quiet, he was slow, he wasn't popular; he wasn't even clean. So she spent little time with him and fully expected him to repeat the fifth grade.

Just before the Nativity holy days, the teacher reviewed Teddy's school records and discovered from his previous teacher's notes that his mother had died and his father showed little interest in him. She began to feel deep pangs of guilt. Why hadn't she investigated earlier?

Then the holydays arrived and the season of gift-giving appeared. All the class bought her presents, including Teddy. He obviously had less money to spend than the others and his offering was merely a gaudy rhinestone bracelet with some stones missing and a halfempty bottle of cheap cologne. The other students began snickering, but the teacher turned the situation around by wearing Teddy's gifts. And when he stayed after school to shyly tell her, "You smell just like Mom," all the things that had been keeping her from caring about this little boy whom no one else cared about suddenly melted away. After he had left, she sat alone in her classroom and cried for what she hadn't wanted to know

The teacher then spent every late afternoon for the rest of the school year with Teddy, helping him catch up with his

studies. One step at a time, he made it. When he subsequently moved away before entering sixth grade, she was sad to see him go, but she knew that he could now hold his own.

Seven years later, she received a note from Teddy, saying he wanted her "to be the first to know" that he had graduated from high school, second in his class. Four years later, he wanted her to be the first to know that he had graduated from college, first in his class. And a few years later, she was also the first to know he had become a physician.

The teacher knew that she played a genuine part in his success, but that she owed him just as much for what he had shown and taught her. It was because of Teddy's own courage in seeking love and attention that she had been the first to see the potential in the little boy no one else had cared about. And in investing a few moments each day in this boy's life, she enriched herself beyond measure!

Strongest Motive

In a remote section of the Andes, a highland tribe attacked a lowland tribe. The highlanders kidnapped a lowland baby girl and took her back to their mountain stronghold. Though the lowland tribe had no knowledge of the mountains or how to climb them, they immediately sent an armed band of their most powerful men after the kidnapped child.

But they had no luck. For several days, they tried every route they could find but

always ran up against walls of sheer rock they could nor surmount, or impenetrable jungle they could not negotiate. Finally, they had to admit defeat and began packing their gear to return to the lowland village. Then they noticed the mother of the stolen infant walking toward them, carrying the precious baby she had lost and coming down the mountain they had been unable to climb.

They asked in amazement, "How were you able to climb those impenetrable mountains, let alone get back your child when our rescue efforts failed?"

She lovingly smiled and said, "It was not your daughter."

How many times something similar happens in our lives. It is only Christ and we who are most interested in the wellbeing and salvation of our soul!

Moment Of Truth

Near the end of the nineteenth century a rich boy and a poor boy got into a fight. The rich boy finally won the scuffle, but as the poor boy got up and dusted himself off, he said, that he would have won if he had had the same nutritious food as the rich boy. The rich boy was hit hard by the truth of what he had just heard but never thought of before.

That moment had a lifelong effect on the rich boy. He gave up the trappings of his wealth, such as wearing expensive clothing. He dedicated his life to serving humanity, especially those without wealth

and in genuine need. He became a physician, a missionary, a musician, a philosopher, and a philanthropist. In 1952, he received the Nobel Peace Prize. As a child he confronted the inequity of his advantages, and for the rest of his life, Albert Schweitzer put them to good use caring for the needs of others in a Christ-like way.

Signature

A former Secretary of the United States Treasury was being interviewed upon the expiration of her term. She noted, "My signature appears on \$60 billion of United States currency. More important, however, is the signature that appears on my life, the strong, proud, assertive, handwriting of a loving mother and father who influenced me with Christian values and example that are important in my daily life."

A FAITHFUL FAMILY

e are all, no doubt, familiar with the story of the Apostle Paul's amazing conversion along the road to Damascus - how he encountered a blinding light from which the Lord spoke to him: "Saul, Saul, who do you persecute me?". The MARTYR EUSTATHIOS, once a prideful Roman general, had an even more unbelievable occurrence that caused him to embrace Christianity. While hunting one day, the general, whose given Roman name was Plakidas, cornered a deer and was prepared to kill him. Suddenly, a dazzling cross of light appeared between the deer's antlers and Plakidas heard these words: "Why are you against Me? I am Christ. Abandon your pagan ways and come to know Me as the living God." Shaken, the general left the forest and immediately sought baptism for his entire family, taking the name Eustathios. His wife was given the name Theopisti, while his two sons became known as Agapios and Theopistos.

Eustathios secretly left Rome with his family to live a simple life of service to the Lord. But life for Eustathios would be far from simple! Arriving in Egypt, his wife was kidnapped and his sons carried off by wild beasts. After 15 years of separation, they were all miraculously reunited in the village of Vadisis.

Eustathios and his family returned to Rome, where the Emperor Hadrian was now in power. The former general was summoned by the Emperor to offer sacrifices to idols with his family. When Eustathios revealed that he was now a Christian, his entire family was put to death in the year 126 A.D.

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
