Affliction

Hope deferred makes the heart sick, but when dreams come true at last, there is life and joy Proverbs 13: 12.

Only the person involved can know his own bitterness or joy – no one else can really share it. Laughter cannot mask a heavy heart; when the laughter ends, grief remains Proverbs 14; 10.

I am slipping down the hill to death; I am shaken off from life as easily as a man brushes a grasshopper from his arm. My knees are weak from fasting and I am skin and bones Psalms 109: 22 - 24.

A happy face means a glad heart; a sad face means a breaking heart. When a man is gloomy, everything seems to go wrong; when he is cheerful, everything seems right Proverbs 15: 13.

Silver and gold are purified by fire, but God purifies hearts. A cheerful heart does good like medicine; but a broken spirit makes one sick Proverbs 17: 3.

A man's courage can sustain his broken body, but when courage dies, what hope is left Proverbs 18: 14?

And so God's people are dismayed and confused and drink it all in Psalms 73: 2.

Spiritual Mothers Among Us

It is not unusual to notice that more women than men attend almost any given service in church. We may also be aware that it is usually the woman of the home who organizes family time to include prayer, Bible reading, celebration of church feast days and church attendance. Women seem to have a natural intuition for prayer—a natural sense for God and for spiritual realities. This being the case, we can appreciate a woman's ability to help others in their spiritual journeys to God. This kind of help, be it from a mother, a clergy wife, a church school teacher, a nun, or a parish woman living the single life, can be referred to as the gift of "spiritual motherhood."

Spiritual motherhood does not have to be any kind of official title or ordained ministry: all baptized Christians are part of the royal priesthood (1Pet. 2:9). Each person receives the gifts of the Holy Spirit at Chrismation and these gifts are manifest in each of us in her own unique way. We could say that just as all baptized women are not the same, so too spiritual mothers have different gifts. Certainly in our day and time we may best be able to identify with particular women—those who may have experienced similar circumstances or spiritual trials. For example, a mother who is having a difficult time with her teenage son might very well find helpful advice from another woman who has already passed through such an experience.

What then might be the basic qualities or characteristics of a spiritual mother? One main quality, perhaps the most important, would be trustworthiness. We can confide in a spiritual mother knowing that those issues we entrust to her will never become public knowledge or even tidbits for gossip or whispering. On the same level as trust is love. We would need to feel loved and accepted by our spiritual mother—the one we look to for real and honest guidance as well as acceptance of us as a person.

Another quality of spiritual mothers would be maturity. This does not necessarily mean attainment of a certain physical age, but rather a maturity of spirit—calmness in the face of what might appear to us like a crisis or an emergency. She would be able to "slow us down" and help us identify what the real problem is and what would be the first step in dealing with it. By her maturity and experience, she would be able to remind us, based on having lived through difficulties herself, that our problem can be solved as long as we ask God's help and are willing to do our part in a patient, prayerful manner.




Considering someone as a spiritual mother may not require actual conversation with her. Simply by being in her presence, we can feel God's love and strength. We can also learn much by observing her behavior, her demeanor with other people, be they her children, spouse, friends, or strangers. Does she exude peace, joy, strength and trust in God? If she offends or saddens someone, is she able to ask forgiveness? Does she live the Gospel teachings? Does she persevere when her own cross becomes heavy and seemingly more than she can bear? Such examples go a long way in reminding us how we ourselves can better live the Christian life.

An additional common quality of a spiritual mother would be her ability to reach out to others in kind and simple ways. Offering to share a cup of coffee and have a quiet talk can be an enormous gift to a busy, burdened person. Speaking a compassionate and encouraging word to someone who is going through a difficult period, or who seems troubled, can be like a cool breeze on a hot day. Offering a hand with housework or meal preparation can prevent disaster for someone who is near a breaking point. Such seemingly small gestures serve to encourage and comfort Christ's "little ones."

Besides serving as an example to us and being one whom we trust, are there other things that our spiritual mother does? She may serve as a mentor. She could recommend books to read, a prayer rule to follow, or spiritual practices to keep, but these would be suggestions rather than dictated rules. Our spiritual mother would be able to help us find our own way—the way to which Christ is calling us. This way varies from person to person, so she would not require from us what may work for her or for other women. She would help us find the way best for us. She would be understanding of our own particular circumstances which are dictated not only by our personality and spiritual maturity, but also by our family, career, health and other such realities of our life.

Having explored the qualities and characteristics of spiritual mothers, perhaps we now realize that we know at least one woman who serves this role in our own lives or in the life of the parish. It is not necessary for one to have formal education in theology or psychology in order to play an incredibly helpful and healing role in Christ's body—the Church. Yes, we have spiritual mothers among us and we receive from them an example of Christian life that we can apply to our own lives and circumstances. Let us give thanks and glory to God for His presence among us in these members of His Holy Church.

The Twofold Coming of Christ

We do not preach only one coming of Christ, but a second as well, much more glorious than the first. The first coming was marked by patience; the second will bring the crown of a divine kingdom.

In general, whatever relates to our Lord Jesus Christ has two aspects. There is a birth from God before the ages, and a birth from a virgin at the fullness of time. There is a hidden coming, like that of rain on fleece, and a coming before all eyes, still in the future.

At the first coming He was wrapped in swaddling clothes in a manger. At His second coming He will be clothed in light as in a garment. In the first coming He endured the cross, despising the shame; in the second coming He will be in glory, escorted by an army of angels.

We look then beyond the first coming and await the second. At the first coming we said: Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord. At the second we shall say it again; we shall go out with the angels to meet the Lord and cry out in adoration: Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord.

Clear Testimony

Let your speech always be gracious and in good taste, and strive to respond properly to all who address you Colossians 4: 6.

Many parishes during special times of the year have religious devotions and services after which a Question and Answer Period is held. One priest as he announced such services and a subsequent gathering, said, "Even if you don't have any questions, come anyway. I am sure that after you have heard what we have to say, you will have some!"

Many times such events raise more questions than they answer. Sometimes that is what happens when a believer tries to explain eternal truths to new believers or inquirers or be a witness to those outside the Church. They are confused more than they are helped. The problem is not with the truth being explained, but with poor communication. Failure may result from lack of scriptural awareness, necessary insights into the reality of Church teaching and the demands of theology.

Counsel to Timothy might well be accepted by everyone else. "...devote yourself to the reading of Scripture, to...teaching...so that everyone may see your progress...watch yourself and watch your teaching. Persevere at both tasks. By doing so you will bring salvation to yourself and all who hear you" 1 Timothy 4: 13, 15, 16.

Thus, when questions are raised about all issues, a spiritual perspective can be provided, or when we have an opportunity to give witness to the values and lifestyle of Christ, we will hopefully have the right answers and will share what is true to God's revelation.

Help us O Lord to make our witness clear and labor faithfully so that friends and neighbors will be eager to turn to Christ from what they hear and see in me, so that we never substitute personal skewed views for Christ's Good News.

Advice for Catechists

Challenge your students to put Christian values into practice. Affirm their efforts.

Talk less and listen more. Sharing the good news is a two-way street.

Electrify class presentations with innovative methods. Don't settle for mediocrity.

Celebrate the present moment with those you teach. Do not wish for the past or dwell on what "might have been."

Hang in there when the going gets tough. Things will look better tomorrow.

Inspire your students by what you do and say. They may remember only 5% of what you teach, but they'll remember 100% of who you are as a Christian.

Schedule time for yourself to replenish your spiritual, emotional, and physical energies.

Touch the hearts of your students with kindness and understanding. Your example of Christian love is the best lesson you'll ever teach.




CROSSWORD FUN

ST. LUKE THE EVANGELIST

A ntioch, in Syria, became a very important Christian center in the early life of the Christian Church. It was here that Luke was born, perhaps as a slave. He was a Gentile convert to the faith of Christ, and one of the remarkable figures of first-century Christianity.

St. Luke is best known as a writer and historian of the Early Church. He is credited with the writing of the Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. The Gospels, of course, are the great treasure of the Church. The word means "Good News." The information they contain informs us about our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The symbol of St. Luke is the ox, usually winged. His Gospel presents the SACRIFICIAL aspect of our Lord's

life. In ancient times, the ox was the beast of sacrifice, offered up in prayer to God. There are also prophetic references to the ox in the book of Ezekiel and the Revelation. His Gospel mainly emphasizes 3 aspects of Christian life: the importance of Prayer,

the inspiration from the Holy Spirit and a loving embrace of sinners. When portrayed in iconography, St. Luke is usually pictured as a bearded, young man.

In his humility and faith, St. Luke served the Lord in a wondrous way. His writings represent a tremendous heritage which he has left to us. How grateful we ought to be for this record of the story of Christ which has come down through the centuries from the pen of this evangelist.

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
