We are a beacon on a hill with the eyes of many upon us; that beacon is the inspired Light of Christ which must shine brightly in our lives.



Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification Romans 14: 19.


We who are strong ought to bear with the failings of the weak and not to please ourselves. Each of us should please his neighbor for his good, to build him up Romans 15: 1, 2.

A Symbolic Interpretation of the rites of the sacramental Mystery of Baptism



The priestly celebrant, vested in white vestments for the most solemn initiation occasion because it is the color and symbol of heavenly joy. In the sacramental Mystery of Baptism, the Church rejoices the one baptized becomes a communicant of the Body of Christ.

The baptized is given a new identity with a Christian name, the name of a saint so he might benefit by this patronage and spiritual support as well as example which he is challenged to emulate.

Since the giving of a name is most important in a person's life, the day which commemorates the saint whose name he bears is celebrated as the person's "name day" or "feast day" and so it becomes for the baptized a festive celebratory time. It is on this day the help of God and patronal saint is invoked to lead a life worthy of the

name. Christians consider their patron saint as another guardian, like their angelic protector; hence a person's name day is also sometimes called his "angel's day."

In ancient times even among pagans, names of great heroes were given to the child so that he would be inspired to great deeds.

The priest then places his hand on the head of the child since the imposition or laying on of hands symbolizes divine protection, as is well explained in the simultaneous prayer that accompanies this action.

The priest performs the rite of exorcism which is expressed in with the practice of blowing and breathing. The priest breathes upon the child to signify the blowing out or expulsion of the devil; then he breathes upon the

child to signify the inbreathing of the Holy Spirit.

The priest, while inbreathing the Holy Spirit, is actually blowing out and expelling the devil. Breathing is the symbol of life. In the beginning God breathed the breath of life into Adam, so now in Baptism the breath of spiritual life is breathed into the soul.

The God parents with the child turn around and face the west, the place of darkness and perdition and are asked to renounce satan. The west is the place where the sun sets, light ends and darkness begins. Darkness symbolizes sin and satan. The priest asks them the same question three times: "Do you renounce satan...?" Each time the sponsors respond, "I do renounce him."

They then turn about to face the east once again, in the direction of the sanctuary and are asked to declare their belief in and service to Christ. The East is where the sun rises and light appears. Christ is called "Orient", that is east, in Scripture and in the liturgical life of the Church. He also calls Himself the "Light of the world" who enlightens all men with the light of His salutary teaching and example. When the sponsors turn around to face the east and the tabernacle where Christ is enthroned in the

sacramental Mystery of the Eucharist, the priest asks three times; "Do you believe in Christ and promise to serve Him?" Three times they respond on behalf of the baptized, "I do believe in Christ and promise to serve him." Then they recite the Profession of faith, the Creed, which enunciates all the major dogmas of Christian faith.

The Servant of God



The priest then blesses the baptismal water and the Oil of Catechumens. As water, which long ago submerged the entire human race, symbolizes purification, and the oil produced from

the olive tree, a branch of which was brought to Noah in the ark by the dove as a sign of reconciliation, symbolizes mercy, the combination of both these symbols signifies that purification of man by water takes place through the mercy of God.

"O Lord and Master of all, show this water to be water of repentance, the bath of rebirth, the renewal of the spirit, so that all who are baptized with this water may put off their old selves and assume the new; that they become likened to your death and become partakers of your Resurrection and be numbered among the first born who are written in heaven and may thank You, God in the glorious Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and ever and forever. Amen."

After blessing the water and oil the priest anoints the child with the oil and makes the sign of the cross on the child's forehead, chest, back, ears, hands and feet so that the child "...may understand and accept the truths of faith,...love God and neighbor as himself...carry his cross willingly...listen to and accept the teachings of the gospel and faith,...do the right thing at all times ...and walk in the way of the commandments...."

In the Old Covenant, oil was used to anoint kings and priests; it symbolizes divine election, approval and consecration of a person to God. In the aforesaid anointing, we have a total consecration of both body and soul to the service of God.

Anointing with oil symbolizes strength and power. In ancient times athletes before entering the arena anointed their bodies. Here it symbolizes the integration of the grace of God with the anointed; divine assistance which helps one live the consecrated and devoted Christian life.

The act of baptism itself is performed with the immersion of the child into the water. Water is the agent and symbol of purification and life. Immersion signifies the child dies to sin and is buried with Christ in order to rise again with Christ and live with Him and in Him (Romans 6: 3 – 11; Colossians 2: 12, 13).

"The servant of God, (Name), is baptized in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

The child is then given a white baptismal robe which is called the "robe of righteousness." The white garment symbolizes the purity of the newly baptized person's soul, which has been cleansed. It also serves as a reminder that he must preserve

righteousness, innocence and integrity throughout all his life.

"The servant of God, (Name), is clothed with the garment of righteousness in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

The person or the sponsors are presented with a lighted candle which signifies the baptized has entered the light of Christ from darkness, "For you were once in darkness, but now you are light in the Lord" Ephesians 5: 8. His faith should be living and active, literally burning itself out for the sake of Christ. His daily life should be a shining and compelling light to his neighbor. "Let your light so shine before men, in order that they see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven" Matthew 5: 16. He must strive to resemble the wise virgins of the parable who met the Bridegroom with their lamps burning and were admitted into the wedding hall" Matthew 25: 1 - 13.

"Take this lighted candle and strive throughout your entire lifetime to shine brightly with the light of faith and of good deeds so that when the Lord comes, you may go forth to meet Him together with all the saints and may enter unhindered into the court of his heavenly glory and reign with Him forever. Amen."

"O Lord our God, Who through the fulfillment of the baptismal font, by your goodness sanctifies those who believe in You, bless this child and permit your blessing to descend on him. As you blessed King David by the hand of your prophet Samuel, bless also the head of your servant (Name), through my sinful hand, filling and inspiring him with your Holy Spirit, that as he increases in stature, even to a ripe old age he may give glory to You and behold the good things of Jerusalem all the days of his life. For to You is due all glory, honor and worship, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, now and ever and forever. Amen."

A GREAT HEALER OF BODIES & SOULS

Nicomedia. His was a divided household, for his father was a pagan and his mother a devout Christian. After the death of his mother, Panteleimon studied medicine under the tutelage of the renowned physician Euphrosynus. His medical skills were noted by the Emperor Maximian, who planned to name Panteleimon his royal physician when his training was completed. But the young doctor fell under the influence of a priest named Hermolaus, who had other plans for him! Hermolaus provided him with a different type of "schooling," teaching him about the Christian Faith every chance he got. Once while walking down the street, Panteleimon encountered a dead child, who had been bitten by a venomous snake. He prayed to God, promising that he would be baptized if the little boy would be brought back to life. God granted this miracle, and Panteleimon kept his promise.

Panteleimon dedicated his life to healing the sick and helping the needy. He took no payment for his labors - he always carried out his treatments in the Name of Jesus Christ. Sadly, not everyone was pleased with the work of this amazing unmercenary. Other physicians, driven by jealousy, reported to the Emperor that Panteleimon was a Christian. Maximian arrested him and ordered his execution, but God spared him from death several times. Others who witnessed this converted to Christianity themselves, further enraging the Emperor. Finally, this great healer was put to death by beheading - but not before the executioner's sword was rendered useless until Panteleimon completed his final prayer.

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
