We are a beacon on a hill with the eyes of many upon us; that beacon is the inspired Light of Christ which must shine brightly in our lives.



Very practically, with our Christian faith inspiring us and the great tradition of charity for which Orthodoxy is best known, we can begin practicing love and concern in our midst. As the saying goes, 'charity begins at home.'

Offer yourself freely to assist our volunteer workers in need. Those who give of themselves do so gladly and will appreciate your helping hand. We can talk all we wish about the way our heavenly Father has blessed our parish, but we must go beyond conversation and get into buckled-up action.

There are a number of souls who already heroically give of themselves each month, There are goodly number of souls who still can overcome their indifference to the needs of our common goal and join us eagerly each month.

We can overcome the kind of apathy that is obviously rampant in our nation today by warming the spiritual atmosphere with our contribution of time for the common good of the parish. 1 Corinthians 6: 20


