


"No, let's not kill him," his brother Reuben said. "Let's just throw him into the pit." (Reuben planned to rescue Joseph later.)


A Colorful Coat

Joseph and His Brothers

Genesis 41:46-42:9: 45:12-46:5



For seven years, Joseph traveled throughout Egypt collecting and storing food. Then when a great famine came to the land of Egypt, an abundance of food was stored to feed all of the people in Egypt. There was even extra grain to sell to people who came from other lands.

When Jacob, Joseph's father, learned that Egypt had food for sale, he sent his sons to buy grain. That was how ten of Joseph's brothers came to be in Egypt. Since Joseph was governor of all of Egypt and in charge of the sale of grain, his brothers came to him.

Joseph recognized his brothers immediately, but they did not recognize the brother whom they had sold into slavery many years before. Joseph pretended to be a stranger. "Where are you from?" he demanded.

"From the land of Canaan," they told him. "We have come to buy grain."


As the brothers bowed low before him, Joseph remembered the dreams he had had many years before.

Joseph's brothers sold him for twenty pieces of silver. When the traders who bought Joseph reached Egypt, they sold him to an officer of Pharaoh. Joseph did excellent work and was soon given an important position.

Years later, Joseph was accused of something that he didn't do and was sent to prison. While in prison, Joseph met Pharaoh's chief cupbearer and chief baker. Each man had a dream. Joseph was able to explain both dreams.


Several years later, Pharaoh had two dreams. In one dream, there were seven fat cows and seven hungry, thin cows. The thin cows ate the fat ones. In the second dream, there were seven plump heads of grain with well-formed kernels on a single stalk. Then seven shriveled heads appeared on the same stalk and swallowed the seven plump heads. Pharaoh didn't know what the dreams meant, but he wanted to find out. It was then that the cupbearer told him about Joseph's ability to interpret dreams.

Joseph was brought out of prison and taken to Pharaoh. He told Pharaoh it was beyond his power to interpret dreams, but that God would tell him what the dreams meant. Then Joseph listened to Pharaoh's dreams and said, "Both of your dreams mean the same thing. There will be seven years of good crops followed by seven years of famine in Egypt."

Pharaoh believed Joseph and said, "I hereby put you in charge of the entire land of Egypt."

Sold!



God's Word says: "God will give Pharaoh the answer he desires" (Genesis 41:16).


Who's in Charge?

Color Joseph and the objects that were in his dreams. Do not color anything that was not part of his dreams.




God's Word says: "His brothers were jealous of him, but his father kept the matter in mind" (Genesis 37:11).



We Are All Brothers


Two of the brothers below are twins. Find the twins and color their robes the same color. Color the robes of each of the other brothers a different color.

Reuben: "Let's throw him in a pit."


Judah: "Let's sell him."
